Pastor: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen.

Psalm 85:1-7 (Revive us again.)

Pastor: LORD, you were favorable to your land. **People: You restored the fortunes of Jacob.** Pastor: You forgave the iniquity of your people.

People: You covered all their sin.
Pastor: You withdrew all your wrath.
People: You turned from your hot anger.
Pastor: Restore us again, O God of our salvation,

People: and put away your indignation toward us. Pastor: Will you be angry with us forever?

Confession of Sin & Absolution

Pastor: Most merciful God, in so many ways, we deceive ourselves, believing that we are "good" while considering others to be unfit for our fellowship and your salvation. Today, we hear about the priest who would not allow words of judgment to be spoken in a house of worship. We learn of a king who executes an innocent man to save himself from public embarrassment. We listen to the account of religious people who had a difficult time understanding how those considered unclean could rightfully become inheritors of your eternal promises. In all these readings, we witness sinful people trying to prove their righteousness, at the cost of others.

ALL: At times, Lord, we are such people. Forgive us! Blot out our sins. Show us your steadfast love, for the sake of Jesus, who alone saves us from sin and death.

Pastor: In Jesus Christ, we are a forgiven people; not because our confession is so sincere or complete, but because God's steadfast love is unchanging, faithful, and just. As a called and ordained servant of the Word, Jesus Christ, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen.

Prayer

Pastor: Gracious God, your only-begotten Son faithfully proclaimed your Word wherever he went. Help us to be faithful in our proclamation, too, even among those people who dishonor your Word. We ask that your love reaches all those for whom your Son gave his life on the cross. For Jesus lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

People: Amen.

Old Testament: Amos 7:7-15 (Amos is expelled from Bethel.)

Lector: ⁷ This is what he showed me: The Lord was standing by a wall that had been built true to plumb, with a plumb line in his hand. 8 And the LORD asked me, "What do you see, Amos?" "A plumb line," I replied. Then the Lord said, "Look, I am setting a plumb line among my people Israel; I will spare them no longer. ⁹The high places of Isaac will be destroyed, and the sanctuaries of Israel will be ruined; with my sword I will rise against the house of Jeroboam." ¹⁰ Then Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, sent a message to Jeroboam king of Israel: "Amos is raising a conspiracy against you in the very heart of Israel. The land cannot bear all his words. 11 For this is what Amos is saying: 'Jeroboam will die by the sword, and Israel will surely go into exile, away from their native land." ¹² Then Amaziah said to Amos, "Get out, you seer! Go back to the land of Judah. Earn your bread there and do your prophesying there. ¹³ Don't prophesy anymore at Bethel, because this is the king's sanctuary and the temple of the kingdom." ¹⁴ Amos answered Amaziah, "I was neither a prophet nor the son of a prophet, but I was a shepherd, and I also took care of sycamore-fig trees. ¹⁵ But the LORD took me from tending the flock and said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel." This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God. Epistle: Ephesians 1:3-14

(Gentiles have also received God's promises.)

Lector: ³ Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ. ⁴ For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love, ⁵ he predestined us for adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will— ⁶ to the praise of his glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves. ⁷ In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace ⁸ that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and understanding, ⁹ he made known to us the mystery of his will according to his good pleasure, which he purposed in Christ, ¹⁰ to be put into effect when the times reach their fulfillment—to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ. ¹¹ In him we were also chosen, having been predestined according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will, ¹² in order that we, who were the first to put our hope in Christ, might be for the praise of

his glory. ¹³ And you also were included in Christ when you heard the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation. When you believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴ who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory. This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

Holy Gospel: Mark 6:14-29 (The beheading of John the Baptist)

Pastor: The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark, the 6th chapter.

People: Glory to you, O Lord!

Pastor: ¹⁴King Herod heard about this, for Jesus' name had become well known. Some were saying, "John the Baptist has been raised from the dead, and that is why miraculous powers are at work in him." ¹⁵ Others said, "He is Elijah." And still others claimed, "He is a prophet, like one of the prophets of long ago." ¹⁶But when Herod heard this, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised from the dead!" ¹⁷ For Herod himself had given orders to have John arrested, and he had him bound and put in prison. He did this because of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, whom he had married. ¹⁸ For John had been saying to Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." ¹⁹ So Herodias nursed a grudge against John and wanted to kill him. But she was not able to, ²⁰ because Herod feared John and protected him, knowing him to be a righteous and holy man. When Herod heard John, he was greatly puzzled; yet he liked to listen to him. ²¹ Finally the opportune time came. On his birthday Herod gave a banquet for his high officials and military commanders and the leading men of Galilee. 22 When the daughter of Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his dinner guests. The king said to the girl, "Ask me for anything you want, and I'll give it to you." ²³ And he promised her with an oath, "Whatever you ask I will give you, up to half my kingdom." ²⁴ She went out and said to her mother, "What shall I ask for?" "The head of John the Baptist," she answered. ²⁵ At once the girl hurried into the king with the request: "I want you to give me right now the head of John the Baptist on a platter." ²⁶ The king was greatly distressed, but because of his oaths and his dinner guests, he did not want to refuse her. ²⁷ So he immediately sent an executioner with orders to bring John's head. The man went, beheaded John in the prison, ²⁸ and brought back his head on a platter. He presented it to the girl, and she gave it to her mother. ²⁹ On hearing of this, John's disciples came and took his body and laid it in a tomb. This is the Gospel of our Lord.

People: Praise to you, O Christ!

The Lord's Prayer—2nd & 3rd petitions (Luther's Small Catechism)

Pastor: Thy kingdom come. What does this mean?

People: The kingdom of God certainly comes by itself without our prayer, but we pray in this petition that it may come to us also.

Pastor: How does God's kingdom come?

People: God's kingdom comes when our heavenly Father gives us his Holy Spirit, so that by his grace we believe his Holy Word and lead godly lives here in time and there in eternity.

Pastor: Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. What does this mean?

People: The good and gracious will of God is done even without our prayer, but we pray in this petition that is be done among us also.

Pastor: How is God's will done?

People: God's will is done when he breaks and hinders every evil plan and purpose of the devil, the world, and our sinful nature, which do not want us to hallow God's name or let his kingdom come; and when he strengthens and keeps us firm in his Word and faith until we die. This is his good and gracious will.

STATEMENT ABOUT HOLY COMMUNION

The Lord's Supper is celebrated in the confession and glad confidence that our Lord, as he says, gives not only bread and wine but his very body and blood to eat and drink for the forgiveness of sins (Matthew 26:26, 28; I Corinthians 11:23-24). In joyful obedience to the clear teaching of our Lord, those are invited to his table who trust his word of promise, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as he forgives and loves us. Because Holy Communion is a confession of faith which is confessed at this altar, any who are not yet instructed, in doubt, or who hold a belief concerning the Lord's Supper that is different from the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod are respectfully requested not to receive the sacrament in the service today. You may come forward for a blessing by crossing your arms across your chest, as an indication to the pastor. If you have questions regarding your participation, or would like to learn more, please speak to the pastor after the service. Thank you!

In preparing to receive Holy Communion, ask yourself these questions:

1. Am I sincerely sorry for my sins, and do I repent of them?

- 2. Do I confidently trust in Jesus Christ, my Lord and Savior, who died for me, paying for my sins, and rose again from the dead, to give me eternal life?
- 3. Do I believe that Jesus is truly present in, with and under the bread and wine in Holy Communion, and that I receive his true body and blood for the forgiveness of sins and strengthening of faith?
- 4. Do I promise, with the Holy Spirit's help, to amend my sinful life, and to declare this resolve through Christian living, faithful worship, and careful stewardship of time, talent, and treasures?
- 5. Do I understand that by receiving the Lord's Supper in this congregation, I am declaring that the teaching of this congregation, a member of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, is also my own?

What does it mean? Why is the Atonement so important for us? Today, we find out. Welcome to worship at Concordia!
